
Thank you for choosing Tigard as a home for your business!

Residents enjoy a range of public transportation options to nearby Portland, Beaverton and Hillsboro, access to more than 16 miles of paved trails and nearly 550 acres of parks and open spaces. Other amenities include shopping at Bridgeport Village and Washington Square Mall. The Cascade Mountains, Oregon's famed beaches and the Columbia Gorge are all accessible as day trips.

Tigard's walkable downtown offers unique shopping, eating and drinking establishments, transit connections and access to bike and pedestrian trails. With public art and multiple trail connections, this area is undergoing a transformation into a walkable destination for residents and visitors alike.



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When do you need to contact City Hall?

PLANNING DEPARTMENT

Planning staff are available to provide information about permits, land use applications and other department requirements, including information related to the following:

- ➤ Signs Most signs require sign permits; please check with staff to see if you will need a permit.
- ▶ Building Permits Generally needed to construct, enlarge, alter, repair, move, change the occupancy or intensity of use of a building or structure or electrical, gas, mechanical or plumbing system.
- ► Home Occupation Permits Required if you are conducting business out of your home in Tigard.
- ► Façade Improvements Changes to the exterior of your building. May require a permit.
- ► Modifications to your place of business Examples include changes to landscaping or parking.

COMMERCIAL CRIMES UNIT

Uniquely funded through the City of Tigard's business license fees, the Tigard Police Commercial Crimes Unit (CCU) is nationally recognized for their expertise in investigating commercial and business crimes. CCU detectives dedicate their time focusing on crimes that affect the Tigard business community, including organized retail theft, embezzlement, burglary, robbery, and other types of crime. CCU can proactively help review crime prevention techniques and provide one-on-one consultations that can help improve the safety of your business.

Tigard Business Resources

Advance Tigard

This program provides scholarships to cover some of the cost of career education, skill development, and training for Tigard residents (no matter where they work) and employees of Tigard-based businesses (no matter where they live).



Business License Fee Waiver

Owners of new businesses in Tigard who complete one of the business-focused training programs with one of our business advising partners, are eligible for a one-time, one-year City of Tigard business license fee waiver for their first year of operation in the City of Tigard.

Tigard Impact Fund

The City of Tigard has partnered with Business Impact NW to offer business loans exclusively for existing Tigard businesses to help them grow. Business loans range from \$5,000 to \$100,000 for businesses that have been in operation for at least one year.

Business Support Scholarship

The City of Tigard's Business Support Scholarship offers business owners and entrepreneurs a reimbursement of up to 50 percent of the cost of business advising services, training, and course work with one of our business advising partners. (Up to \$500 per program/course).

Enterprise Zone/Existing

The Enterprise Zone offers qualified businesses that are located within a defined boundary, a three-to-five-year tax exemption on new investment (equipment, buildings, and facilities) when the firm also invests in new employees by increasing their workforce by 10 percent.

The Enterprise Zone tax exemption on new equipment is especially useful for manufacturers, headquarters locations, exporters and traded-sector firms that are making capital investments and increasing their workforce.

Webinar Series

The City of Tigard's economic development team hosts a series of business support webinars focused on topics of interest to entrepreneurs and business owners. These webinar feature experts from organizations like the Small Business Development Center, Micro Enterprise Services of Oregon, Business Impact NW, and Livelihood NW. Topics are selected annually based on input from local business owners and range from getting loan ready to marketing advice. In an easy-to-access online format these sessions are convenient and helpful to entrepreneurs thinking about business and early-phase business owners.





TIF Grants

The City Center Building Improvement Program

This program provides matching grants for existing businesses in the City Center TIF District to make improvements to the exterior of their business (up to \$25,000). New catalyst businesses moving into vacant spaces in Downtown are eligible for funding to make interior upgrades (up to a maximum of a \$75,000 for eating and drinking establishments, up to \$25,000 for all other businesses).

The Triangle Business Opportunity Fund

This fund supports entrepreneurs by providing matching grants for construction costs associated with building renovations. Grants provide a 50% funding match (up to a maximum of \$50,000 for new eating and drinking establishments, and up to \$25,000 for all other businesses) to help fund the cost of interior or exterior renovations for businesses moving into vacant ground floor commercial spaces in the Tigard Triangle.

Los Empresarios De Tigard

The program strengthens Tigard's small business community by connecting Spanish speaking entrepreneurs to the services and support they need to launch and grow successful businesses. Working with organizations who specialize in business support services, this program leverages the power of partnership to support business growth and resiliency.





Launch Pod Incubator Programs

Tigard's Launch Pod business accelerator uses two city-owned food carts to help new entrepreneurs launch their businesses in Tigard. Business coaching, access to customers at Universal Plaza and reduced rent help remove barriers for first-time entrepreneurs.




Opportunity Cafe
