TRAFFIC SAFETY ENFORCEMENT RESULTS AVAILABLE

The results from three recent traffic safety enforcements are now available.

Officers conducted an enforcement focused on DUII patrols during the traditional end of summer break and the Labor Day holiday, from August 16 – September 4. They worked more than 28 hours on this mission and took 54 total actions, including:

- 3 arrests for DUII
- 13 tickets for speeding, driving while suspended, distracted driving, no operators license, no insurance
- 38 warnings for driving without lights, failure to obey a traffic control device, no insurance, failure to drive within the lane and illegal u-turn

During the month of August, officers also conducted focused speed patrols. They worked 9 hours on this enforcement and took 33 total actions, including:

- 1 arrest for failure to return a suspended license
- 12 tickets for speeding, no seat belt, distracted driving, equipment issues, no insurance, failure to display license plate, failure to register vehicle
- 20 warnings for speeding, equipment issues, distracted driving, failure to renew registration, failure to obey a traffic control device and others

Officers also worked an enforcement focused on the proper use of seat belts and car seats between August 16th – September 4th. During this time, officers worked 20 hours and took 87 actions, including:

- 26 citations for speeding, driving while suspended, seat belt use, distracted driving, equipment issues, failure to obey a traffic control device, no insurance, no license and others
- 61 warnings for speeding, equipment, failure to carry proof of insurance, no license and others

These enforcements are made possible thanks to federal grants for officer overtime from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, in partnership with the Oregon Department of Transportation and Oregon Impact.
